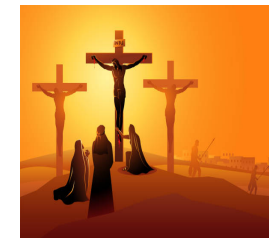

WHO IS RESPONSIBLE?

Recently cocaine was found in the White House. People want to know who is responsible. The President and first lady were apparently not there when the incident happened; so the search is on to see who is responsible for an illegal substance in the White House. Someone is responsible. We are all responsible for our own actions. Let us look at some common characteristics of responsibility.

Responsibility implies knowledge. The person who is responsible knows what is being done. A baby is not responsible; therefore, a baby cannot commit sin. Sin involves being responsible. A person is a sinner because he or she commits sin, not because they are born that way. Ezekiel wrote “The soul who sins shall die. The son shall not bear the guilt of the father, nor the father bear the guilt of the son.” (Ezek. 18:20 NKJV) Sin is something that is committed. John helps in our understanding by adding, “Whoever commits sin also commits lawlessness, and sin is lawlessness” (1 Jno. 3:4). A baby cannot do what the very definition of sin implies. When a person knows what he or she is doing is against the will of God, then sin is committed. (Rom. 3:20)

Responsibility implies consequences. When a person is responsible, there are consequences for being irresponsible. Perhaps this is the reason so many today don’t want to be responsible. Certain sins are attributed to lifestyle or heredity. Paul tells us “Whatever a man sows, that he will also reap.” (Gal. 6:7) This verse is one of consequences.

Responsibility implies ownership. To be responsible means I am the one who must do something. No one else is responsible for me. A man is responsible to provide for his family (1 Tim. 5:8). I am also responsible for where I spend eternity. My parent’s religion doesn’t matter. My friend’s religion won’t matter. Jesus poses a question about ownership. He asks, ‘For what profit is it to a man if he gains the whole world, and loses his own soul? Or what will a man give in exchange for his soul?’ (Matt. 16:26) The only one responsible for me getting to heaven is me.

Are you responsible? Are you responsible for becoming a Christian like the Bible teaches? Jesus stated, “He that believes and is baptized will be saved” (Mark 16:16). No one else can do that for us. There is no such thing as “proxy baptism.” When Judgment Day comes and we don’t make it to heaven, we might think about this question: Who was responsible?

The Bible Says:

2 Corinthians 5:10 “For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad.”
